Course: Personnel Economics (Master)

Course content

We study advanced problems in the field of personnel by applying economic methods from gam theory, information economics and econometrics. The lectures mainly focusses on theoretical models. The tutorials cover related empirical/experimental studies (presented by students) and problem sets. Over the fourteen weeks of the summer term, we have one lecture and one tutorial per week (each lasting 90 minutes). We cover the following topics:

- 1. Basic moral hazard problems (recap)
- 2. Multitasking and job design
- 3. Delegation of decision rights
- 4. Career concerns
- 5. Human capital investments
- 6. Social preferences
